7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

This two story stucco house located at West 414 Sumner Avenue is listed as a contributing structure in the Marycliff-Cliff Park National Register Historic District. It is quite likely the last structure in the community designed by Spokane architect Kirtland K. Cutter for Floyd McCroskey.

The cross gabled roof has a pediment protrusion on the west-gable end and this element has been added to the south gable end. During a recent rehabilitation, the three-tab composition shingle roofing was removed and replaced with a milled cedar shingle, painted green.

The primary facade is given an assymetrical appearance by the south gable roof line which extends down the eastern side to the story and a half level. The pavilioned south portion of this structure planes out under the steeped roof line. An entry portico has been added to provide sheltered access to the structure and echos the Mission quality of this residence.

Fenestration on the structure is a combination of three paned side-by-side casement windows in sets of two and three. A large casement picture window has recently been returned to its muntin configuration of twelve square panes under a recessed arch.

The structure was remodeled in 1957 with the addition of a large bedroom on the northeast portion under a flat roof, a sliding glass door off the dining room and a fiberglass shed roof addition placed over the sliding door. During a 1989 rehabilitation, the sliding glass door was removed and replaced with French doors and the shed roof replaced with a more permanent addition which echoes the Spanish styling yet is clearly more contemporary. The structure's cream colored stucco exterior is highlighted with wood trim/molding painted a forest green.

A high wall between the house and garage encloses a patio on the east side of the structure accessed through an iron gate. The Spanish influence continues in both the garage and the wall.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This home was built in 1923 and is the final architectural legacy left to Spokane by Kirtland Cutter. The home was commissioned by prominent Spokane insurance man, Floyd McCroskey, after his marriage to the daughter. of the Kemps. The Kemps operated the Kemp and Hebert Department Store at Washington and Main and later acquired the Palace Department Store located on the site of the present Nordstrom's Building. The site at W. 414 Sumner is a subdivision of the Kemp estate at W. 404 Sumner and was a wedding gift to their daughter and Mr. McCroskey. In 1948, the home was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. O'Leary. The first floor bedroom was added in 1956 after Mr. O'Leary suffered a heart attack thus saving him the strain of climbing stairs. The widowed Mrs. O'Leary passed away in 1987 and the estate sold the property to Mr. Caton in 1988. The architect, Kirtland Cutter, came to Spokane in 1886 at age 26 to work in his uncle's bank. By age 28, Cutter had designed the controversial F. Rockwood Moore mansion, a tudor reminiscent of the English countryside. By 1889, the Coeur d'Alene mines were booming and fortunes were being made. People wanted homes to match their Cutter became the pre-eminent northwest architect of his era, designing the Campbell, Wakefield and Finch mansions in Browne's Addition and in 1910-12 created his largest masterpiece yet --- the Davenport Hotel. After World War I, the mining flood was reduced to a trickle and commissions for Cutter waned. After completing the McCroskey House, he moved to Souther California at the age of 63. Some of Kirtland Cutter's other major achievements include the Rainier Club in Seattle, the rustic lodge on Lake McDonald in Glacier National Park and Kirtland Hall at Yale University in. New Haven Connecticut. Kirtland Cutter's imagination transformed the short-lived but spectacular flow of money through the City of Spokane into a permanent heritage through his architecture. If his works had been paintings instead of buildings, they would by now have been removed to larger city's museums or collections. Cutter's works of art are too big to be moved. They largely remain in Spokane. Mr. Cutter passed away in Long Beach California in 1939.
